Mental Health Co-Responder Program

- □ What is it?
 - The KPD Mental Health Co-Responder Program is a collaboration between Central County Services (CCS) and the Killeen Police Department (KPD) to integrate a Qualified Mental Health Professional (QMHP) into routine police operations dealing with mental health concerns.

This QMHP, skilled in mental health treatment and crisis intervention, is provided by CCS through the Rider 52 Grant funded by the 88th Legislature.

Mental Health Co-Responder Program

- ☐ How does it work?
 - A Qualified Mental Health Professional (QMHP) is stationed within the police department, with access to radio communications, and responds alongside officers when the situation is considered safe.

The QMHP conducts a risk assessment of the individual, develops an action plan in coordination with the officer and the individual, and starts implementing steps to address the mental health crisis.

- CCS and Temple PD have been running a co-responder model for over two years.
- Temple PD has minimized the wait time for CCS crisis team responses during operational hours, reducing reliance on the Hotline Center and local mental health authority dispatch.
- This approach shortens the time individuals have to wait to access services during a mental health crisis.
- It offers a real-time mental health provider on the street to support law enforcement in addressing the needs of individuals facing mental health concerns or crises.
- There is no cost to the City of Killeen, as CCS will handle the administration and implementation of grant requirements.

Recommendation

Staff advises that the City Council endorse the Memorandum of Understanding between Central County Services and the Killeen Police Department for the implementation of the Mental Health Co-Responder Program.
